Dear Ms Moscogiuri, Ms Horton and Mr Ruthven

Third Sector SEEN is a UK wide network for third sector and charity staff and volunteers committed to promoting and supporting sex equality and equity in the workplace and for those we serve. It probably won't surprise you to hear that, over the last two years, we have been contacted by members, volunteers and former staff of Amnesty, who have expressed concern at the ideological capture of a once credible and impactful charity.

We are writing regarding your recent reports *A Growing Threat - The Anti Rights Movement in the UK* and *Like a Snowball: The Growth and Impact of the Gender Critical Movement in the UK*.

In your report you label Third Sector SEEN as part of an 'anti-rights movement' and say that we 'aim is to restrict human rights by undermining human rights protections in law and practice'. This is untrue. We would like to see your evidence of this and the basis for you to accuse us in this way. We are not anti-rights. As part of the SEEN network, we organise around the protected characteristic of sex. We fully support the sex-based rights of women and LGB people and have never campaigned against those with the protected characteristic of gender reassignment. In fact, we would highlight that Amnesty's own intervention to the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom in *For Women Scotland Ltd v The Scottish Ministers* (FWS), had it been successful, would have seen women with the protected characteristic of gender reassignment (trans men) lose their maternity rights and protections.

You also state that 'Research shows that anti-rights movements have access to substantial financial resources and funding networks.' Again, this is untrue. Third Sector SEEN has no funding and is run entirely by volunteers.

We seek a retraction of your report and a public apology for the incorrect information you present about us.
